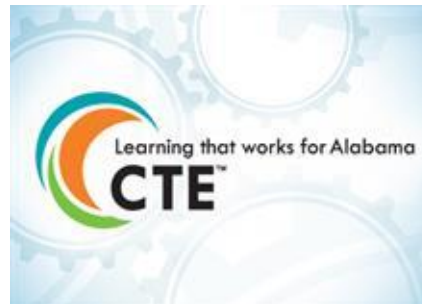

Commonly Asked Questions

What is Work-Based Learning?

Work-Based Learning is a learning experience for a student at an employer's worksite.

Will I get paid and earn school credit?

Yes, students participating in the program are eligible to leave campus in order to work and earn an hourly wage provided by the employer. Students will earn school credit based on completing course requirements, documenting work hours, and completing training plans with regular evaluations.

Do I have to be employed to enroll?

Students should be employed or actively seeking employment. The coordinator will work with the student and employers to find good placements and create training plans.

Can I participate if I have an internship?

Yes, the placement should provide at least 10 hours each week and last through the semester. The internship should familiarizes students with a specific industry.

Do I have to provide my own transportation?

Yes, students are required to have dependable transportation from school to work every day.
